Throughout the past year, the library has hosted a variety of classes catering to different interests. These have included genealogy assistance, historical speakers, craft socials, watercolor classes, crochet groups, and informational meetings on clean energy. These new additions complement the already-popular programs such as book clubs, literacy classes, math tutoring, and AARP tax assistance.

Erin Johnson, the technology staff member at the LPPL, has recently expanded her responsibilities by taking on the new role of planning activities specifically tailored for teens and adults. ## A great year for children's programming...

Rain or shine, every Friday morning at 10:30 the children eagerly gather for the enchanting weekly storytime with Ms. Linda. During this past summer, Ms. Linda hosted special guests who enriched storytime with their talents. RiverJack Z, Annie Vigne, and Lucy Orringer captivated the audience with songs, dance, and music, making the storytelling experience even more memorable.

Summer programming continued this year with a celebration of Smokey Bear's 80<sup>th</sup> birthday at the John Brown Farm with help from the Lake Placid Volunteer Fire Department, Mountain Lake PBS, Cornell University Uihlein Maple Research Forest, Paul Smith's College Adirondack Watershed Institute, the Adirondack Mountain Club, NYS DEC, and Speechie Trish. Other summer programs included visits from musician Nan Hoffman, Michael Clough from the Southern Vermont Natural History Museum, and naturalists from the Point Au Roche State Park Nature Center. The library was pleased to host children's authors, including Calvin Alexander Ramsey and Caitlin Friebel. Families also enjoyed a bilingual program with Veronica Salazar, highlighting her delightful picture book *El Tesoro del Datilero (The Dale Tree Tale*).

The Homeschool Thursday group explored an array of topics, including volunteerism, biographies, the art of sculpture, Haudenosaunee culture, and even had a visit from an Environmental Conservation Officer and his K-9 Partner. The library also introduced a LEGO Club which focused on collaborative

projects around a monthly theme.

The library assisted in many off-site programs, including events related to the Harriet Tubman Beacon of Hope Statue and a moth ball with science writer Loree Griffin Burns at the John Brown Farm, in addition to events at the Cascade Welcome Center centered around Kate Messner's *Over and Under* titles. Children's community outreach continued with monthly visits to Head Start and Pre-K 4. LPPL also continues to organize the children's activities for Lake Placid Community Day and assists with children's programming at Teddy Bear Picnic, Arbor Day, and the Rotary Club's Dam Duck Race. StoryWalks® complete our children's outreach with installations at the John Brown Farm, Cascade Welcome Center, Heart Lake, and community events.

For the third year, LPPL collaborated with the Adirondack Family Book Festival to bring a diverse group of distinguished authors and illustrators to Lake Placid. Planning is already underway for 2025's festival. Mark Saturday, August 16, on your calendars as a day to celebrate the power of children's and YA literature.
